## The wait continues

The Counseling Center's highest wait list increases as the Center remains understaffed.

JCU's Counseling Center on campus has 96 students waiting to see therapists. The Gothic Times reported last month that there were nearly 90 students on the wait list, making it the longest wait list for counseling services in the school's history.

According to the International Association of Counseling Services (IACS), if there is a wait list, "students may choose to not seek counseling at the counseling center. Also, students who are put on a wait list are more likely to leave the university." Online information from IACS goes on to say, "A study by Wilson, Mason, and Ewing (1997) in the Journal of

Counseling Psychology found that attrition rates increased by 14 percent for those students who were put on a wait list compared to those who received timely counseling." The AUCCCD survey reported that 65.2 percent of students that

were asked about their counseling

centers said that counseling helped them stay in school.

Abisola Gallagher-Hobson, the director of Counseling and Wellness Services, said that according to the amount of students enrolled at NJCU, there should be five and a half counselors. There are still only three counselors working in the office. Gallagher-Hobson said that she does not know when there will be more counselors hired for the center.

"A search to replace the position available has not been approved, nor have I heard anything about adding temporary part-time counselors," said Gallagher-Hobson. Last month, The Gothic Times reached out to Jimmy Jung, vice president for Student Affairs and the Dean of Students, Dr. Lyn Hamlin about the center's wait list. According to Jung and Dr. Hamlin, the administration was in the process of hiring two part-time counselors, as well as a social worker and a licensed therapist who deals with alcohol, drugs, homelessness and food insecurity.

In a follow-up response, Dr. Jung and Jodi Bailey, interim associate vice president for Student Affairs, confirmed that semester's search for a social worker was unsuccessful and has been reopened. Administration is also still in the process of hiring two part-time staff members to assist in the Counseling Center. A national health and wellness assessment will also be open starting the week of January 24. The student feedback from the assessment "will be utilized to benchmark us against other

schools nationally to be better able to assist our students in need," according to Dr. Jung and Bailey.

Along with hiring more therapists, NJCU will also continue promoting the Community Center. The center is an initiative within the Center for Community Engagement and Campus Life and includes the Gothic Knights Food Pantry which opened in November.

A survey conducted by the Association for University and College Counseling Center Directors (AUCCCD) reported that most counseling centers are increasing their hires. The survey, taken by 621

colleges, including NJCU, and found that "35.3% of centers gained staff positions. Counseling centers continue to gain staff member FTE [Full-Time Equivalent] at a higher level than those losing staff."

In an email interview, President Henderson said working on solving the Counseling Center's problem was "an important topic" at a recent senior team meeting.

### NJCU remembers students after death



hree NJCU students died within two weeks last month, leaving the campus community in mourning at the end of the semester. Francis "Frank" Clerie, 25, Georgesette Shurn, 20, and Aaliyah Duncan, 21, died of unrelated, sudden illnesses. All students were off-campus at the time.


Clerie was a biology major set to graduate this May and was the president of the Tau Kappa Epsilon (TKE) fraternity. At TKE, he was called "the pillar of our organization... he gave each brother the motivation to do their best and take every opportunity given. He was a friend, a mentor, and one of the greatest leaders our chapter has ever seen." Clerie had hoped to become a doctor after graduation.

Shurn was a transfer student from Newark studying Computer Science. Her aunt, Teneka Medal, described her as "a perfect kid. She loved school and doing hair. She was an only child. Her mom wanted her to have a good education and she loved education. She was a mentor to young children. She was always happy and always helping others. I would call her to help me with my resume and she will be right here helping me... I would call her to help kids with their homework and she will be right here helping them."

Duncan, a CO-OP resident and management student from Newark, worked at the NJCU bookstore. "Sisters are angels who lift us to our feet when our wings have trouble remembering how to fly," Barbara Etheredge, Duncan's sister said. Lemuel Atkins, another NJCU student and Duncan's boyfriend said, "You are my love, my life, my smile and I will remember you until end times. Forever and Always."

n 8-foot obelisk constructed from what seems crumpled car or plane metal stands between the entrance and the information desk. come back another day, though; the exhibit is only open three days a week. The Poet Laureate of Jersey City greets you good morning as he turns the corner with a band of literary and visual artists alike following behind him.

Founded in May 2011, Mana Contemporary is a cultural center located on Newark Avenue. It is dedicated to providing a platform for contemporary art and artists through exhibitions, studio programs and public programs. The center was founded by Israeli immigrant Moishe Mana, a

billionaire businessman and real estate developer who moved to the US in 1983. Currently, Mana Contemporary holds art exhibitions featuring the work of many famous artists, to name some: Andy Warhol (The Original Silkscreens, showcasing 95 pieces from 1967-1968, including some that have never been shown in the United States). Dan Flavin (Cornered fluorescent light, which uses combinations of light, color, and space); Austria's most famous contemporary artist, Arnulf Rainer (Crosses and Angels); and John Chamberlain (Photographs, which showcases 70 works he once referred to

as "self-portraits of the nervous system" from 1989-2002).

NJCU alumni Rashad Wright and Jersey City's first Poet Laureate in 14 years (the last one was Aaron B. Jackson in 2004) was granted studio space at Mana Contemporary as part of his position being Poet Laureate. He plans to hold group activities like workshops and poetry events in his studio and will collaborate with Mana Contemporary for more events this coming year.

## World War 119

he past couple of years have seen NJ Transit experience a decline in bus driver applications. The transportation company "rents" its bus routes to other companies like Academy and Coach USA to combat the shortage of drivers. For those unfamiliar with the 119 bus, it runs from Bayonne to New York City, but always skips students and other

passengers going to Journal Square and the stops before it. I took the 119 bus route towards Journal Square for two weeks leading up to the end of the semester to see how different drivers reacted to someone wanting to head to the square.

On days that I worked and had class, I left my uniform at home so I could stop at my apartment near Stuyvesant Avenue. One day, my class ended early, so I waited for the 119. "Where are you going?" the driver asked. 'Journal Square," I replied. "Wait for the next bus. He's right behind me." A crowd of students began piling up at the stop. 20 minutes later, another

119 stopped at the Bayview Avenue bus stop. Again, students going to any stop before Journal Square weren't allowed on the bus. The 10 bus came 17 minutes later with another 119 bus behind it, skipping over the stop. The crowd of students swarmed towards the street to enter the bus, as if the bus stop was in the middle of the street with oncoming traffic.

"I think it's terrible that we have to wait in the cold for a bus to show up and tell us we can't get on," stated Amir Khan, a transfer student at NJCU. "The weather is crazy and nobody wants to get sick. There may be set schedules but if it's going to Journal Square I might as well be allowed on. I see enough space to let us on and off safely without

disrupting their route. It's only a few stops. They're just being lazy, I think."

The afternoon commute home isn't the only problem either. Morning rush hour is chaos for students on the way to the main campus. On days that I had an 8 a.m. class, I would have to take the 7:14 or the 7:39 bus to be at campus on time and passengers were packed like sardines. Some were on the back

door stairs while others were on top of each other, barely able to move when someone else entered the bus. Packed backpacks would bump in to faces of people sitting. I'm no stranger to the occasional bump or nudge, but the 119 is a silent war of personal space and comfort.

We shouldn't be forced to wait for a different bus when they have the same routes to and from Journal Square. If the 119 lets on ten or fifteen students, it makes an easier, safer and more comfortable commute for those of us who are tired of getting packed inside a sardine can on wheels.

## **Aretha Franklin's "Amazing Grace"**

fter 50 years, a documentary about Aretha Franklin's "Amazing Grace," is coming out soon in select theaters. Franklin died in August at the age of 76. In 1987, she was the first woman inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame.

Many fans are excited to finally see this film however, some are wondering why it took so long to come out. Film director Sydney Pollack struggled to release it sooner but because of several different technical and legal issues he was never able to.

The technical issues were a result of the sound recordings from Franklin's performance of some songs not matching the footage they had. As a result, the project was put aside for a while in Warner Brother's film vault. Finally, in 2007, a producer named Alan Elliot wanted to bring the project back and had the footage digitally restored.

When Elliot was ready to showcase it to film festivals, he was not allowed because legally only Sydney Pollack had permission to use Franklin's image and likeness; Pollack died in 2008. As a result, Elliot was not able to showcase the film at different festivals however he did show it to Franklin's family members. After viewing the film, they gave him permission to use her image and likeness for the documentary. The film has been entered, for consideration, in the 2019 Academy Awards.

Aretha's Franklin's "Amazing Grace" is set to play in theaters in early 2019.

### **Spring season sports outlook**

#### Men's Volleyball

NJCU Men's Volleyball will challenge Bard College for their 2019 season opener on January 30. The Gothic Knights finished their 2018 season 10-18 with a winning percentage (pct) of .385 while their competitor Bard College had a .125 pct and finished 3-21. The last time the two teams met was on February 15. With home court advantage, NJCU won the match 3-1.

The team can't compete in the New Jersey Athletic Conference (NJAC). However, depending how well the team's record turns out, they might have the chance to qualify for the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC). If the Gothic Knights do qualify, they will have to collect a winning percentage of .500 or higher. The team is scheduled to face three NJAC competitors throughout the season. Kean University on February 16, Ramapo College on February 26 and Rutgers - Newark on March 7.

The program will be led by Jorge Rodriguez who was assistant coach since 2015 but he will now be head coach for their 2019 season. The team will compete in a total of 28 matches with 14 home games and 14 away games. The Gothic Knights will also participate in the Keuka College

Invitational in Keuka Park, NY. They are scheduled to face Keuka College on March 2, John Jay College on March 2 and Pratt Institute on March 3.

#### Baseball

NJCU Baseball will challenge Stevens Institute of Technology for their 2019 season opener on February 27. The last time the two teams met was on March 18 and the Gothic Knights loss 4-5. NJCU was 21-18 for the overall season with .538 pct while Stevens finished their season at 26-17 with .605 pct.

Last season the team didn't earn an NJAC bid however they were eligible for the ECAC Baseball Championship. It was later announced that the tournament would be canceled due to a lack of qualified teams.

In the 2019 season, the baseball team will be led by Jerry Smith who has been the head coach since 2011. The team will compete in a total of 52 matches with 14 home games, 20 away games and 6 neutral games. The Gothic Knights will also participate in the RussMatt Central Florida Invitational in March. They are scheduled to compete in 18 conference games. Their NJAC competitors are Rutgers (Newark & Camden), Kean, Montclair State, TCNJ, William Paterson, Rowan, Stockton and Ramapo.

#### Softball

NJCU Softball will start their 2019 season off in Florida for the Gene Cusic Collegiate Classic. The team will compete in a total of 12 games from March 9 to March 15. Afterward, they will challenge John Jay College in a doubleheader for their first away game on March 25. The last time the two teams met was on April 19 for a doubleheader. Unfortunately, both games were canceled due to rain. The Gothic Knights finished their 2018 season 4-30 with a .118 pct.

The program will be led by Ashley Martinez who was the assistant coach in 2018 but will now be the head coach for their 2019 season. The team will compete in a total of 34 matches with 12 home games, 16 away games and 8 neutral games. They are scheduled to compete in 18 conference games. Their NJAC competitors are Rutgers (Newark & Camden), Kean, Montclair State, TCNJ, William Paterson, Rowan, Stockton and Ramapo.
